St. Nicholas: In the midst of the Advent Season and our preparations for the Christmas holiday there are three saint's days on our Lutheran Calendar. Most people are not aware of these days, or the story associated with each of these saints of God who set before us an example of Christian faith & life. As stated in the Augsburg Confession, "Our churches teach that the remembrance of the saints is to be commended in order that we may imitate their faith @ good works according to our calling." (Augsburg Confession 21). We often neglect such commemorations unless they fall on a Sunday, and even then the common practice is to remain with the regular lectionary. But perhaps remembering these "three saints of Advent" can help us remain spiritually grounded in this exceptionally busy time of year.

The three saints commemorated each December are St. Nicholas (feast day December 6th); St. Ambrose (feast day December 7th); & St. Lucy (feast day December 13th).

St. Nicholas is probably the most well-known of the saints. In fact, there are more churches dedicated in his honor than any other saint. So much legend and tradition have been placed upon the story of his life makes it necessary for us to peel away the superimposed layers to get at more verifiable information concerning his life.

Nicholas was born in the village of Patara in what is now Turkey. At that time the area was thoroughly Greek in its culture and language. His parents were wealthy & raised him in the Christian faith. Apparently when they died in an epidemic, they left him a large estate, which enabled him to help the poor, sick, & suffering, leading to his reputation as being generous & charitable. His uncle, who was also named Nicholas & was bishop of Patara, took young Nicholas in & provided for the furthering of his education & spiritual life. It happened that young Nicholas was in the city of Myra when the clergy & people were meeting to elect a new bishop, & he wound was elected. This was the time of Emperor Diocletian's persecution of Christians. Nicholas was arrested, imprisoned, & tortured. When Constantine became emperor, Christians, including Nicholas, were released.

Nicholas was bishop when a heresy known as Arianism, which denied the divinity of Christ, was spreading. Nicholas was a staunch defender of orthodoxy & was present at the *Council of Nicaea* in 325 A.D, 1700 years ago. He argued ferociously on the basis of Scripture that Jesus Christ was both God & man. Nicholas also took strong measures to combat paganism in his district, tearing down many pagan temples & replacing them with churches. He died December 6th, 343 A.D. in Myra & is buried in his cathedral church.

In a year in which we commemorate the formulation and signing of the Nicene Creed, it is important for us to remember that St. Nicholas was there. He was staunch and consistent in his defense of the Christian faith and sets before us an example to follow when persecuted for our faith. More about the other saints next week.
